

Albany takes 2 of 3 league games from UMaine

John Arel pitched six innings of four-hit ball and worked around three errors by his teammates on Saturday afternoon to lead the **COLLEGE BASEBALL** University of Maine to a 5-2 victory over the University at Albany in the second game of an America East baseball doubleheader at Varsity Field in Albany, New York.

The Great Danes won the opener 7-1 and won the rubber game of the series on Sunday 9-1.

In Game 2, Arel (2-7) claimed his second straight win with another strong outing for UMaine (17-29, 6-11 AE). The sophomore right-hander spaced four singles while striking out nine and walking one. Both of the runs he allowed were unearned.

For the second consecutive week, freshman righty Nick Silva worked a perfect seventh inning and struck out two to notch his fourth save of the season.

Freshman Colin Ridley powered the UMaine offense with a two-run home run and a two-run single. Jon Salcedo (RBI), Jeremy Pena

(2 runs scored) and Brenden Geary each contributed two singles.

Kyle Sacks singled twice and knocked in a run and Matt Hinchy hit an RBI single for UAlbany (19-23, 7-10 AE). Starter Stephen Woods (3-5) allowed seven hits and five runs in his five-inning stint.

The Black Bears grabbed the lead for good in the first inning. Lou Della Fera and Danny Casals walked around a single by Pena. Ridley followed with a two-run single through the middle, but the visitors stranded two runners.

UMaine scored once in the fourth on Geary's one-out single to center, a groundout and Salcedo's run-scoring base hit to left-center.

The Bears added two in the fifth as Pena singled with one out and Ridley launched his team-leading sixth home run over the fence in right field.

UAlbany scored twice in the sixth on a one-out single by Will Miller, Kevin Donati's fielder's choice, a wild pitch and consecutive singles by Sacks and Hinchy. However, Arel worked out

Ben Bishop shuts out NY Islanders

Former UMaine goalie leads Tampa Bay to conference finals

TAMPA, Florida — Victor Hedman scored two goals and former University of Maine standout Ben Bishop recorded his fifth career shutout in the Stanley Cup playoffs as the Tampa Bay Lightning earned a 4-0 win against the New York Islanders in Game 5 of the Eastern Conference second-round series on Sunday.

The Lightning won the best-of-seven series 4-1 and advance to the Eastern Conference Finals to face the winner of the second-round series between the Washington Capitals and Pittsburgh Penguins.

Bishop made 28 saves while Nikita Kucherov had his ninth goal of the postseason as the Lightning advance to the conference finals for the second consecutive year.

Hedman gave the Lightning a 1-0 lead at 13:49 of the first period. He took control a loose puck at the high slot and beat Islanders goalie Thomas Greiss on the near post.

Lightning center Brian Boyle scored his third goal of the postseason at 18:41 in the first period to make the score 2-0.

Defenseman Matt Carle went behind the net and passed the puck to Boyle in the slot and Boyle snapped a shot past Greiss above his shoulder.

Hedman's second goal came on a Lightning power play at 4:22 in the second period. Jonathan Drouin made a backhand pass that banked off the boards and

Hedman scored on a one-timer from the right circle to make the score 3-0.

Kucherov added a goal at 4:40 in the third period on a breakaway to give the Lightning a 4-0 lead.

Cavaliers 100, Hawks 99

ATLANTA — Every time Kevin Love got open beyond the 3-point arc, the crowd at Philips Arena would gasp. Eight times the Atlanta Hawks' fans gasp was followed by a groan.

Love scored 27 points, including tying his career-high with eight 3-pointers, and the Cleveland Cavaliers completed a four-game sweep of the

Hawks with a 100-99 win Sunday at Philips Arena.

The Cavaliers advanced to the Eastern Conference finals for the second straight season and will await the winner of the Toronto-Miami series.

Kyrie Irving scored 21 points and had eight assists, and LeBron James added 21 points, 10 rebounds, nine assists and made a big defensive stand on the Hawks' final possession.

With Cleveland leading 100-99 with 10 seconds to play, James tied up Atlanta point guard Dennis Schroder on a drive inside the paint and won the ensuing jump ball to help the Cavs hang on.

Cleveland was sizzling hot from the 3-point line throughout the series. The Cavs hit 16 3s on Sunday — 10 in the first

half — and made 62 in the final three games of the series.

Schroder paced a balanced Atlanta offense that had five players finish in double figures. He hit back-to-back layups late in the fourth quarter, the second putting the Hawks ahead 97-96 with 1:31 to play. But he couldn't past James on his last shot.

James scored on a goaltending call and a jumper and the final two minutes, and Tristan Thompson also had a key block on Schroder late for the Cavs.

Cleveland can look forward to some rest. In the other Eastern Conference semifinal, Toronto leads Miami 2-1 in what has been a tight, physical series that has seen both teams suffer injuries to key players.

Hahn beats Castro

in playoff for 2nd PGA Tour victory

CHARLOTTE, North Carolina — Former shoe salesman James Hahn put his best foot forward to win the Wells Fargo Championship in a playoff against fellow American Roberto Castro on Sunday at Quail Hollow Club.

South Korean-born Hahn, who had missed the cut in his previous eight starts, broke out of his slump in style, sinking a four-foot par putt to win at the first extra hole.

Castro made Hahn's task considerably easier by pulling his drive into the creek left of the fairway.

Hahn, 34, said he had started to question his future after his recent run of poor form.

"Eight straights missed cuts is tough," he said in a greenside interview as his voice cracked with emotion.

"You start questioning yourself, are you good enough? Will it ever happen again? And then you start thinking into the future, as far as selling shoes again for a living.

"It's crazy to call myself a two-time PGA Tour champion."

Hahn missed a six-foot par putt at the 72nd hole that would have won it in regulation. He then watched on a television monitor as Castro sank a par putt from a similar distance to send the event to a playoff.

Hahn (70) and Castro (71) finished regulation at nine-under-par 279, one shot in front of Englishman Justin Rose.

Americans Phil Mickelson and Andrew Loupe, third-round leader Rickie Fowler and defending champion Rory McIlroy of Northern Ireland were two strokes back in a tie for fourth.

Rose (71) hit the front early in the final round but a three-putt bogey at the 16th hole proved his undoing.

"This is a real disappointment. Putter was ice cold today," said the 2013 U.S. Open champion.

Fowler started the round poorly and a double bogey at the par-five seventh, where his second shot bounced out-of-bounds, rocked his confidence.

"I didn't get out of the gate swinging well off the tee, kind of fought that a little bit through the round, so yeah, obviously it sucks," Fowler said.

Mickelson and McIlroy both shot 66, but started the day with too much work to do.

"Unfortunately, one bad hole yesterday cost me," said Mickelson, referring to his quadruple bogey at the 18th hole on Saturday.

McIlroy was pleased with his progress after three weeks

Jutanugarn becomes first Thai LPGA winner

Ariya Jutanugarn had an up-and-down final round Sunday, but she held on become the first player from Thailand to win an LPGA Tour event.

The 20-year-old Jutanugarn fired a final-round, even-par 72 in the Yokohama Tire LPGA in Prattville, Alabama, to finish at 14-under 274 and capture her first LPGA title by a stroke.

She did it with her mother on hand on Mother's Day. "Thank you for my mom for being with me all the time to support me and happy Mother's Day," said Jutanugarn.

Morgan Pressel, Stacy Lewis and South Korea's Amy Yang finished tied for second at 13 under.

Jutanugarn had been unable to win tournaments in two previous occasions in which she held the third-round lead, and she was not as sharp Sunday as she had been on Saturday, when she tied the tournament record with a 63.

Jutanugarn had four bogeys on Sunday, but she countered that with four birdies at the Senator Course at Capitol Hill on the Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail.

Jutanugarn's bogey on the 17th hole, where she two-putted from about 8 feet out, reduced her lead to a single stroke.

At about the same time, Pressel made a birdie putt on the 18th to keep her in contention, and Lewis saved par on the final hole despite hitting her tee shot into the left rough.

Jutanugarn needed a par on the final hole to get the victory, and her drive on the 18th hole went into the left rough.

Her second shot fell short of the green but landed above a bunker. Jutanugarn chipped to within 5 feet before sinking her par putt.

"So tough, I feel the three holes I can't control anything," said Jutangarn. "My legs were shaking, my hands were shaking."

Yang fired a 67, but her bogey on the 17th hole proved costly. Lewis and Pressel both recorded 68s on Sunday.

Lewis has won 11 times on the LPGA Tour, but she has now gone 49 events without a victory. Her runner-up finish Sunday was her 11th-second-place finish during her title drought.
