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that have led to players transferring.

“One of the things we’ve talked with the guys about is certainly the way they’re being coached and that’s never come up,” he said of the possibility he is too tough on the players.

Walsh said the challenge continues to be finding the right student-athletes who want to embrace UMaine athletically, academically and emotionally.

“Fit is really important for us, maybe more important for us than it is at some other places,” said Walsh, who believes Little and Eke, along with Vann and Harewood, had the right makeup.

“I’m not going to sit here and tell you that I wouldn’t have recruited these kids,

because I feel like they were a good fit and they fit our culture,” he said.

Walsh has stressed the importance of having all of his players buy into the program philosophy if they are to succeed as a team. He did not criticize the departing players in that regard, but indicated those who remain, or are coming to UMaine, are committed.

“I am looking forward, really excited, to coaching a group that is fully invested and all-in,” he said.

Walsh admitted that he has been re-evaluating his coaching approach because of some shortcomings he demonstrated last season.

“Self-evaluation is really important all time,” Walsh said.

“There was something missing as far as my ability to get this team to respond the right way when things got tough,” he added.

holes to fill with the departure of six regulars, including four transfers and two seniors.

The transfers combined to score 1,056 points last season, which represented more than 46 percent of the team’s offense. It also accounted for nearly 38 percent of the total minutes played.

When factoring in the departure of seniors Till Gloger and Shaun Lawton, the Black Bears will have to replace 67 percent of their offensive output from 2015-2016.

“We have other guys that can have a huge impact, already in the program, that we feel really comfortable with,” Walsh said.

Little, a 6-foot guard from Wyandanch, New York, was the Black Bears’ second leading scorer last season, averaging 14.7 points per game. He also ranked second on the team in assists

(2.6 per game), steals (1.2 spg) and free-throw percentage (.804).

Little played in 23 games, including 20 starts, but his season was cut short by a foot injury. He was an America East All-Rookie Team pick in 2015.

Eke is a 6-7 interior player from Plainfield, New Jersey. He appeared in all 30 games, making 22 starts, and finished fourth on the team scoring 9.5 points per contest and led the way in rebounding (6.8 per game).

Eke’s .612 field-goal percentage led the ballclub as did his 1.6 blocked shots average.

Following the morning announcement of the transfers, Walsh announced later in the day the signings of 5-10 guard Marcus Floyd from Sunrise Christian Academy and 6-6 guard Ilker Er, who spent the past season at San Jacinto (Texas) Junior College.

# UMaine signs 2 players in wake of defections

ORONO — On the same day that it revealed two more players were transferring to other schools, **MEN’S BASKETBALL** the University of Maine announced the pending arrival of two new student-athletes.

Marcus Floyd of Wilmington, Delaware, and Ilker Er of Istanbul, Turkey, have committed to play for coach Bob Walsh’s Black Bears starting in the fall.

Junior guard Kevin Little and sophomore forward Devine Eke on Tuesday offi-

cially joined Issac Vann, Lavar Harewood and walk-on Walter King as UMaine players transferring out of the program.

Floyd is a 5-foot-10 guard who comes to UMaine from Sunrise Christian Academy, a prep school in Kansas. He previously played two seasons at Trenton Catholic Academy in Hamilton, New Jersey.

“He’s a chip-on-the-shoulder type kid,” Walsh said. “He just plays with something to prove ... he’s a competitor, a big-time competitor.”

Floyd averaged 14.7 points per game for Trenton Catholic in the state tournament and helped lead his team to

runner-up finish in the Non-Public B South Final as a senior. He spent his first two years of high school at the Phelps School in Malvern, Pennsylvania.

He reportedly also attracted interest from the likes of Texas State, Idaho State, Iona and Louisiana-Monroe.

“Offensively, he is almost impossible to keep out of the paint. I think his toughness and competitiveness sets him apart from other guards,” said Sunrise Christian coach Kyle Bankhead.

“I absolutely loved coaching Marcus and think he can be a high level defender as he learns the defensive system under coach Walsh,” he added.

Er, a 6-6 wing/forward, played at San Jacinto Junior College in Texas, where he averaged 10.0 points and 7.5 rebounds for a team that went 22-10 in one of the top junior college leagues in the country.

“He really has a great reputation as a shooter,” Walsh said.

“He’s also a tough, mature young man with a team-first mindset who will fit in great with our program,” he said.

Er, who previously played for Arlington Country Day in Florida, received scholarship offers from Louisiana State and Rhode Island when he was in high school.

Frank Vogel has reached a deal in principle to become the new coach of the Orlando Magic, the Orlando Sentinel reported Thursday.

Vogel will replace Scott Skiles, who resigned as coach last week after one season on the job.

Vogel, 42, wasn’t retained by the Indiana Pacers after spending the previous five-plus season as coach of the franchise. He went 250-181 in the regular season and made five playoff appearances.

The Memphis Grizzlies were highly interested in

Vogel’s services. The Houston Rockets and New York Knicks also had interest.
