Hazard Field in Biddeford, Maine.

The draw is the third of the season for Southern Maine, which stands at 0-4-3 overall. The Noreasters, also no stranger to a tied game, earned their third consecutive double-overtime draw and fourth of the season to move to 1-2-4. UNE took an early 1-0 lead when sophomore Lee Esposito tucked a left-footed shot in to the upper right corner of the goal in the fourth minute converting a feed from freshman Jose Escamilla. The Noreasters maintained their one-goal advantage through the first half despite being outshot by

the Huskies 8-2. UNE goalkeeper sophomore Tom Benoit made four saves in the first 45 minutes. Southern Maine pulled even with UNE early, as Ramadan took advantage of a Noreasters’ miscue in the back to easily score on an open net. Following the Ramadan goal, both teams had shots on frame but neither could earn the game winner, forcing regulation. In the first overtime, the Huskies had the lone offensive chance as Ramadan put one on target but could not beat Benoit. UNE controlled the offense in the second overtime, outshooting USM 4-1.

## Boston’s Porcello stifles Birds

BALTIMORE — Rick Porcello pitched a complete game, and Mookie Betts and David Ortiz hit two-run homers as the Boston Red Sox beat the Baltimore Orioles 5-2 Monday. The first-place Red Sox (86-64) improved to 20-9 within the American League East since July 1. Boston leads the second-place Orioles (82-68) by four games with 12 games remaining. Baltimore was a half-game ahead Toronto for the first AL wild-card spot pending the Blue Jays’ late Monday game at Seattle. Porcello (21-4), the major league leader in wins, allowed four hits and no walks while striking out seven. He entered the game with a 1-4 record and 5.53 ERA against the Orioles in seven previous starts. Jackie Bradley Jr. and Dustin Pedroia each had two hits for the Red Sox, who won their fifth in a row and moved to a season-best 22 games over .500. Baltimore starter Dylan

Bundy (9-6) gave up five runs on six hits in five innings. The rookie had won at Boston on Sept. 13 in his previous start. It didn’t take long for the game to have an edge to it. The Red Sox took a 2-0 lead in the third. Xander Bogaerts singled with one out, and two batters later, Mookie Betts homered to left on an 0-2 pitch from Bundy. It was the 31st homer of the year for Betts, who reached base for the 32nd consecutive road game. That brought an ovation from many of the Red Sox fans at the game. Tempers flared in the fourth when Manny Machado was hit by a pitch by Porcello, who exchanged words with the Orioles third baseman as he walked slowly to first. That hit-by-pitch came back to bite Porcello, who gave up a run-scoring double to Mark Trumbo. Machado stared back at Porcello after touching home with his hand to make it 2-1. The Red Sox padded the lead with three runs in the

fifth. Pedroia had an RBI single, and Ortiz smacked a two-run homer off Bundy. That gave Ortiz seven homers this year against the Orioles and 53 in his career. It was his 35th long ball of the season overall. Porcello gave up a solo homer to Adam Jones in the eighth. On Sunday night in Boston, Hanley Ramirez slugged two home runs, including the go-ahead solo shot in the seventh inning, and had four RBIs to help the Red Sox beat the New York Yankees 5-4. Ramirez also launched a three-run shot two innings earlier. Ramirez has 28 homers on the year, nine in September and 20 since the All-Star break. He also matched his career high in RBIs at 106, set in 2009 with the Florida Marlins. Ramirez was 9-for-16 with four homers and nine RBIs in the four-game series with the Yankees. Robby Scott earned his first career victory in 2/3 innings of relief for Boston. Koji Uehara notched his

seventh save with a scoreless ninth. Red Sox starter Drew Pomeranz stumbled through a 3 2/3-inning no-decision, allowing four runs on seven hits and two walks with three strikeouts. Pomeranz is 0-3 in five starts since his last win Aug. 20 at Detroit. Gary Sanchez smashed his second home run in as many days and his 16th of the season in just 41 games, the most by a Yankees rookie since Hideki Matsui clubbed 16 in 2003. The only Yankees rookie to hit more homers in a season was Alfonso Soriano, who hit 18 in 2001. Tyler Clippard (1-1 in AL) took the loss after coughing up Ramirez’s homer. Yankees starter CC Sabathia tossed four scoreless frames before surrendering three runs in the fifth and another in the second. **NOTES:** Orioles RHP Kevin Gausman (8-10, 3.43) will face Boston LHP Eduardo Rodriguez (2-7, 4.98), a former Baltimore minor-leaguer, on Tuesday.

The Gorham native placed a strong 15th out of 124 runners in the meet hosted by Boston College, leading the Black Bear men to a fifth-place finish out of 15 schools.

Coach Mark Lech’s team accumulated 183 points, finishing behind Dartmouth, Providence, Arkansas and Brown. Orach completed the 8K course in 24 minutes, 55 seconds, averaging just over five minutes per mile. All seven of UMaine’s runners finished in the top 50, while the difference between Orach and No. 5 man Lucas Bourget was a solid 1:03. Jacob Johns was the Black Bears’ No. 2 man in 36th place, followed by Levi Frye (41), Simon Powhida (45), Bourget (46), Josh Horne (48) and Aaron Willingham (50). The UMaine women went on to finish 12th out of 13 teams in the meet, with top runner Kaitlyn Saulter of Hermon recording a 55th-place finish. Providence cruised to the team title. UMaine returns to action on Friday for its final home meet of the season against border rival New Hampshire at 3 p.m.

The Maine Cross Country Festival of Champions, which this year will attract teams from Maine, Vermont, Connecticut, Rhode Island and Canada, is scheduled for Oct. 1 in Belfast. Last weekend’s regular-season action included the three KVAC entries from Penobscot County — Bangor, Brewer and Hampden Academy — competing together in a multi-team race at Hampden Academy. The three boys schools were separated by just one point, with Bangor (47) edging out Brewer and Hampden, both with 48. Hampden’s Wyatt Lord continued his strong start to the season, covering the 5K course in 16:29.58. The girls competition was close as well, with Brewer eking out a 35-49 win over Hampden, while Bangor was third. Hampden’s Simone Withers was the top individual in 21:16.36. Skowhegan, Winslow and Belfast also competed in the meet. The final week of action before the Maine Cross Country Festival of Champions will be a busy one for Penobscot Valley Conference teams with three invitationals on the schedule. The Lynx Invitational at Mattanawcook Academy in Lincoln is scheduled for Tuesday, with the Seacoast Invitational at Sumner High in East Sullivan slated for Friday.

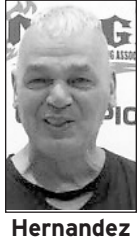

## Washburn wrestler wins gold in Ireland

Despite 8,000 miles of traveling, getting through six customs stations and managing very little sleep, James “Chico” Hernandez said his recent trip to Ireland over Labor Day weekend was worthwhile. Hernandez picked up a pair of gold medals and a silver while competing in the North American Grappling Association Championships in Dublin. The Washburn native went 3-1 during the tourna-

ment. He took first in the master’s division and claimed the championship belt in submission grappling and Brazilian jiu-jitsu. He was defeated in the open division in submission grappling by Polish wrestler Sebastian Kozok, who possesses a long list of titles and is 23 years younger. “My attitude was if I lose, I guess I am supposed to lose

because of my age, and if I win, I look cool,” Hernandez said. “There was no pressure, and you don’t know unless you try. “What was a really good feeling to me was the respect many great fighters there gave and showed to me,” he added. Hernandez was awarded the Gaelic Athletic Association Sports Medal by the Garda, which is the Irish National Police. He has posted 20 NAGA fight victories and has claimed 16 medals in association tournaments.

NAGA holds submission grappling and Brazilian jiu-jitsu tournaments throughout North America and Europe and is the largest submission grappling association in the world. “People ask me if it was worth [traveling to Ireland], and I say yes as the sacrifices are a small price to pay,” Hernandez said. “It’s nice to see how the other half live, and life is so exciting I hate to miss a second of it. “Plus, it’s a very cool feeling to be a champion of Ireland,” he added.
