Home runs power Jays by Rangers

ARLINGTON, Texas — Needing a win to stay alive, the Toronto Blue Jays reverted to what they do best: hitting the long ball.

Toronto clubbed

three home runs — all the first two innings — to beat the Texas Rangers 8-4 Monday afternoon and even the American League Division Series at two games apiece.

The deciding Game 5 will be played Wednesday in Toronto. Neither team has won a home game in this series.

The Blue Jays led all of the majors with 232 home runs during the regular season. After two losses in Toronto, the Jays rediscovered their power stroke in Texas. Shortstop Troy Tulowitz-

ki broke open Game 3 with a three-run homer in Sunday night in Toronto's 5-1 victory. On Monday, third baseman Josh Donaldson, first baseman Chris Colabello and center fielder Kevin Pillar each went deep with Toronto's season hanging in the balance for the second consecutive game.

Pillar (3-for-4) finished with three RBIs, while Donaldson and Colabello each drove in two runs. Toronto racked up 12 hits.

The offense only told part of the story. The Blue Jays' pitching staff gave up only five runs in the two games at Globe Life Park.

Toronto starter R.A. Dickey made his first career postseason appearance a memorable one, even if he didn't qualify for the win. The 40-year-old

knuckleballer allowed only one run, but he was pulled with two outs in the fifth inning for Game 1 starter David Price.

Price got the next nine outs, working into the eighth, to pick up the victory despite allowing three runs.

With Price out of the mix for the start Wednesday, Toronto manager John Gibbons will turn to right-hander Marcus Stroman in Game 5. Texas figures to counter with ace left-hander Cole Hamels.

The Jays jumped all over Texas starter Derek Holland in the first two innings, giving the left-hander his first career postseason loss. Holland couldn't get an out in the third before getting yanked for right-hander Colby Lewis.

Donaldson started the onslaught with a two-run bomb to right in the first. Colabello followed two outs later with a solo blast to right for a 3-0 lead.

Pillar hit a mammoth shot to left-center in the second for a four-run lead.

When the dust settled, the Jays had scorched Holland for six runs on five hits. Lewis, the Rangers' regular-season leader in wins, couldn't stem the tide.

Of the Rangers' 11 hits, nine came from right fielder Shin-Soo Choo, third baseman Adrian Beltre, shortstop Elvis Andrus and catcher Robinson Chirinos. Designated hitter Prince Fielder, left fielder Josh Hamilton and first baseman Mitch Moreland — three of Texas' big bats — combined to go 1-for-10.

Cubs hammer homers, beat Cards

CHICAGO — Rookies Kyle Schwarber and Kris Bryant slugged two of a postseason-record six home runs as the Cubs

seized command of their National League Division Series with an 8-6 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals in Game 3 on Monday.

Chicago won its second straight to take a 2-1 lead in the best-of-five series. The Cubs would clinch a berth in the NL Championship Series with a Tuesday victory at Wrigley Field.

Second baseman Starlin Castro, first baseman Anthony Rizzo, right fielder Jorge Soler and center fielder Dexter Fowler also went deep for Chicago.

Bryant delivered the key blow — a two-run homer in a three-run fifth that gave the Cubs a 4-2 lead. Rizzo followed with a solo shot to make it 5-2.

Cubs right-hander Jake Arrieta improved to 2-0 in the postseason despite allowing four runs in 5 2/3 innings. Cardinals right-hander Michael Wacha took the loss after giving up four runs in 4 1/3 innings.

St. Louis trimmed a 5-2 deficit to a single run in the sixth with right fielder Jason Heyward's two-run home run to left off Arrieta that scored left fielder Matt Holliday.

Arrieta departed after hitting pinch hitter Brandon Moss with a pitch. It was the Chicago ace's shortest since he allowed four runs in five innings in a May 16 loss to the Cleveland Indians. On Monday, Arrieta gave up five hits while walking two and striking out nine.

Soler got the runs right

back in the bottom of the sixth. His first-pitch homer to left scored pinch hitter Chris Coghlan and gave the Cubs a 7-4 lead.

Fowler added a one-out solo shot in the eighth off right-hander Jonathan Broxton.

Cardinals first baseman Stephen Piscotty's two-run, ninth-inning homer with two outs cut the Cubs' lead to 8-6.

The six homers — by six different players — set a postseason record. The Cubs hit five against the San Diego Padres in a game in the 1984 NLCS.

Schwarber's one-out solo homer in the second inning opened a 1-0 Cubs lead. Schwarber, who sat out Game 2 in St. Louis, sent Wacha's 2-2 pitch to the left field bleachers for his second homer of the postseason and 18th overall.

The Cardinals jumped in front 2-1 in the fourth. Arrieta opened the inning with walks to Piscotty and Holliday. Shortstop Jhonny Peralta doubled home Piscotty, and center fielder Tommy Pham brought in Holliday on a fielder's choice to third.

In the bottom of the fourth, Castro forced a 2-2 tie with a first-pitch solo homer that went 413 feet to the left field bleachers.

Later in the inning, shortstop Addison Russell tripled to deep left with two outs but departed the game with a left hamstring strain. Javier Baez, who entered as a pinch runner for Russell, remained in the game at shortstop.

Bryant made it 4-2 in the fifth, connecting on Wacha's 3-2 pitch for a two-run homer to left. The homer — his first of the postseason — brought home right fielder Jorge Soler and earned a curtain call from Cubs fans.

Defense getting job done for Patriots

FOXBOROUGH, Massachusetts — Defense is going to play second fiddle in New England, and that's on the very best day for the Patriots.

That's life playing along with Tom Brady, Rob Gronkowski and an offense that scored 149 points in the first four games.

A 30-6 win at Dallas on Sunday was the latest example that Bill Belichick's retooled defense is very much trying to find its identity.

But with the Dallas defense battering Brady early and forcing the Patriots to punt on three of their first four possessions, New England's defense kept the Cowboys from moving the ball

and provided Brady and the offense endless opportunities to make adjustments.

It was the first time the Patriots went on the road and help the opposition without a touchdown since December 2010.

The effort had Belichick raving.

"Just go out there and just do it every week. Did they score?" defensive end Jabaal Sheard asked rhetorically after his two-sack performance. "We wanted to hold the offense to no touchdowns. ... They did get yardage. But at the end of the day, we held our own in the red zone."

And the effort started by shutting down the Cowboys rushing attack. Injuries to Tony Romo and Dez Bryant aside, Dallas does sport argu-

ably the best offensive line in football and the Patriots met that challenge head on.

"I think that is something we have to do every week," Sheard said of by far New England's best performance against the NFL this season. "It is the NFL, everybody wants to run the ball. You have a lot of great backs. Definitely you have to stop the run. That is something we have been trying to do since day one."

The Patriots do believe in everything working together — the defense feeding the offense, either with field position or by getting off the field quickly.

"On defense, the big thing is we are not paying attention to anything the offense does. They have a job and we have a job. So no matter if

they are scoring every possession or if they are going three-and-out or kicking field goals. We just have to get the ball back," safety Devin McCourty said. "I think from playing here for a couple years, we know if we can just keep getting the ball back, no matter what they are doing, eventually they will put points on the board and we will make a run."

A work-in-progress New England defense carried its weight in Dallas. It has a chance to keep the momentum going again on the road this week with a trip to Indy to take on the struggling Colts, who could get a jolt from the return of quarterback Andrew Luck from a shoulder injury that kept him on the sideline the past two games.

NASHUA, New Hampshire — Elizabeth Terry and Taylor Shaw each scored two goals in the first 22 minutes of

Kayla Royer also scored two goals while Lauren Russell added the other for the Eagles (5-6). Mikayla Toth provided two assists with Kerianne Downing and Libby Kain posting one each.

Kaitlin Dolloff made seven saves. Jordan Parece, Marykate Sweeney and Leah Ingalls tallied a goal apiece for 2-11 Rivier. Stevie Charest and Emily Foster combined to make 12 saves.

Football Gamecocks' Spurrier steps down

South Carolina coach Steve Spurrier is retiring, effective immediately, and an interim head coach will be named Tuesday, The State newspaper of Columbia, South Carolina, reported Monday.

Spurrier, 70, informed his team of his decision Monday, and quarterbacks coach G.A. Mangus is expected to be named the interim head coach, a source told The State.

Spurrier is in his 11th season with the Gamecocks after returning to college football following a stint as a head coach in the NFL. He built South Carolina into a national power, but the Gamecocks on just seven games last year and it is 2-4 this season.

He won the 1996 national championship and six SEC titles in 12 years at Florida.
