

# Husson football team wins fifth straight

Husson University built a 41-point halftime lead on Saturday afternoon on the way to a 54-8 Eastern Collegiate Football Conference victory over Gallaudet at Hotchkiss Field in Washington.

John Smith ran for 135 yards and three touchdowns and Joe Seccareccia threw for three more scores as the Eagles (5-1 overall, 4-0 ECFC) registered their fifth consecutive win.

Coach Gabby Price's team outgained the Bison (0-6, 0-4 ECFC) 392-117 in a dominating performance.

Smith set the tone as Husson rushed for 272 yards while utilizing 10 different ballcarriers. He turned in touchdown runs of 9, 6 and 19 yards, all in the first half.

Stephen Day scored on a 29-yard run and Josh Lovins returned an interception 27 yards for a score. Seccareccia (7-for-11 passing), threw scoring passes of 26 and 3 yards to Robenson Saintard (4 receptions, 39 yds.) and one of 28 yards to Jon Saban.

Jean Gabriel and Bryant Wade spearheaded the defense with six tackles each.

Gallaudet was led by QB Ramon Johnson (8-for-28, 59 yds.) and Austin Hundley (9 carries, 43 yds., 1 TD). Carnelius Smith and Richard Harty each piled up 15 tackles.

The Eagles already led 13-0 when they scored three times during a span of 3 minutes, 35 seconds in the second quarter to build a 34-point cushion.

Husson returns to the Winkin Complex next Saturday for an ECFC matchup against SUNY Maritime.

## Endicott 37, MMA 14

At Beverly, Massachusetts, the Gulls erupted for 17 points during the final seven minutes of the first half, building an advantage they would not relinquish in a New England Football Conference matchup.

Sam Ouellette completed 15 of 31 passes for 245 yards and a touchdown to spearhead the defense for Endicott (2-4), which outgained the

Mariners only 369-350 but came up with five turnovers, including four interceptions.

Chris Lipscomb led the Gulls' receivers with four catches for 77 yards and also had a 43-yard run.

Fullback James Ferrar sparked MMA with 25 times for 144 yards, including a 2-yard touchdown run. Quarterback Michael Fahey ran for 72 yards and went 4-for-14 passing good for 67 yards.

Endicott jumped in front on a 45-yard interception return by Lawrence Gonzalez, but the Mariners equalized when Fahey capped a 62-yard drive with a 3-yard TD run late in the first quarter.

However, the Gulls went to work over the last 6:53 of the first half.

First, the hosts covered 68 yards in eight went plays, capped by a 9-yard scoring pass from Ouellette to Jacob Simons. Endicott got the ball back and moved 53 yards on eight plays, culminating in a 1-yard TD dive by Spencer Walsh.

Endicott got the ball back one more time after a Mariners punt and got into position for Kyle Regan to kick the first of his three field goals, a 22-yarder that made it 24-7 at intermission.

MMA couldn't get closer than 14 points the rest of the way.

Jeddy Doyon registered 11 tackles and Alex Gamester posted 10 to spearhead the Mariners defense.

Connor McLaughlin made 14 tackles and had an interception for Endicott.

attempt blocked to end the first half, regained the momentum early in the third quarter.

The defense provided the spark when Ricard forced running back Donald Liotine to fumble and Cabrinni Goncalves recovered at the SBU 31.

The Bears needed only five plays and a pass interference penalty to score. Belcher's 12-yard keeper off the left side helped set up his own 2-yard scoring run.

"I'm a bigger kid and I can take a little more hits, so I don't mind putting my shoulder down to get a couple extra yards," said Belcher, who picked up yards on designed quarterback runs and scrambles.

"I do whatever the team needs me to do: If I need to run inside, to throw the ball here or there," he added.

Sean Decloux's PAT tied the game 10-10 with only 5½ minutes gone in the half.

UMaine regained the lead two plays into the fourth quarter with a nine-play drive. Belcher completed three consecutive passes, including an 18-yarder to Jaleel Reed down to the 1-yard line.

However, the Bears were forced to settle for a 19-yard field goal by Decloux that made it 13-10 with 14:53 to play.

Three plays later, UMaine got the big boost it needed with a stellar defensive play.

This time, freshman linebacker Sterling Shef-

field broke through and hit quarterback Conor Bednarski as he was throwing. Bates picked the ball out of midair and ran it back 31 yards for a momentum-building touchdown that made it 20-10 with 14:22 remaining.

"I just did my job, tried to contain it and a gift from God, the ball just came down," said Bates, a senior from Westbrook. "It just came to me and I just tried to take off and get in the end zone."

A muffed punt by Stony Brook's Jaheem Woods opened the door for another Decloux field goal, this one of 36 yards, as UMaine pushed the lead to 23-10 with 5:42 to play.

"It was great," said De-

cloux, a senior from Canada.

"I've had my ups and downs. It started off with a make, the second kick a miss, and then I was able to forget about it and make the next two field goals as well as PATs," he added.

The Seawolves charged into the locker room at halftime with an extra spark provided by the blocked field goal. Decloux's 44-yard attempt was low and knocked down at the line, leaving Stony Brook up 10-3.

"It's a 43-yarder into the wind, so it's not a ball you can hit straight up in the air like a PAT," Decloux said, "but that being said, it came off my foot too low."

Rahim Cassell made 10 tackles for SBU.

UMaine grabbed the lead on its second possession when Belcher's 32-yard pass to Jason Simonovich led to Decloux's 43-yard field goal with 1:24 left in the quarter.

UMaine threatened again, but Belcher was stuffed on a fourth-and-one run at the SBU 37. The Seawolves countered as Joe Carbone hit a wide-open Ray Bolden for a 41-yard hookup to the UMaine 11 to facilitate Przemyslaw Popek's 27-yard field goal.

Stony Brook got the ball back three plays later when Collins was hit by Julian Quinton and fumbled at the UM 28. The Seawolves cashed in on a 2-yard TD toss from Bednarski to Cal Daniels that made it 10-3.

## Shires advance in Class C soccer prelim

HOULTON — A Pat Howe goal just one minute into Saturday's Class C North soccer prelim against Bucksport was all the scoring the Houlton boys needed as the No. 7 Shires beat No. 11 Bucksport 1-0 to advance in the playoffs.

Houlton (9-4-2) will now visit No. 3 Central (13-1 Wednesday in the quarterfinal round in Corinth. The two teams did not meet in the regular season, but shared a common opponent in Orono. The Shires lost to Orono 1-0 and 3-1 in their two contests, while Central beat the Red Riots 3-2, but also lost 4-3. Houlton has outscored opponents 58-14 on the season, while Orono has outscored its opponents 95-18.

Bucksport ends its season with a 2-12-1 record.

Against Bucksport, the Shires did a nice job of controlling the ball for much of the contest. Houlton received all the scoring it would need early in the game as Connor Grant carried the ball to the left wing and drew a pair of Bucksport defenders as he approached the net. Grant delivered a soft pass to Howe on the far post to beat Golden Bucks goalkeeper Cody Larsen with 38:53 to play in the first half for the only goal of the game.

"Defenses prepare for Connor because they know he's a scorer," Howe said. "So when they double teamed him, he hit me and I just put it into the open net. It felt pretty good,

but it felt even better to hold them (Bucksport) off the scoreboard for 80 minutes."

"We had a bit of a let down in the back, and they (Houlton) took advantage on the scoring play," said Bucksport coach Matt Morrison. "The rest of the game played out as I anticipated. We heard we were pretty similar in style, with both teams doing a good job possessing the ball. Both sides had lots of good chances."

In the final minute of the game, Bucksport unleashed a furious bid to produce the game-tying goal and had several good scoring chances. The best chance came when Houlton goalie AJ Henderson was out of the net to make a save, but the ball got past him and appeared to be heading for the goal. Shire defender Dylan Johnston successfully cleared the ball away to preserve the shutout.

"We stepped up on the line and Dylan did a nice job clearing the ball out of the box," first-year Houlton coach Caleb Byron said. "We made sure everyone was taking care of their responsibilities and communicating with each other. Our back end play has been really important for us this year."

Larsen made 11 saves on 15 Houlton shots for Bucksport, while Shire netminder Henderson stopped four of five shots. Larsen had to leave the game in the final minute of action after colliding with Grant in the scoring area while both were going for the ball.
