Nominees for Pro Football Hall of Fame cut to 25

When the field of Pro Football Hall of Fame modern era semifinalists was cut to 25 Tuesday, it included three first-ballot nominees — quarterback Brett Favre, guard Alan Faneca and wide receiver Terrell

These 25 join previously nominated seniors — quarterback Ken Stabler and lineman Dick Stanfel, along with contributor/ owner Eddie DeBartolo Jr. as the full roster of names to be considered by induction into the 2016 Pro Football Hall of Fame.

The selection committee will address this task Feb. 6 in San Francisco, the day before Super 50 is played at Levi's Stadium in Santa Clara, Calif.

Two other players, tackle Tony Boselli and linebacker Sam Mills, are semifinalists for the first time, although they were previously eligible. Among the 25 semifinalists are 22 players — 15 from ofteams) and three coaches.

The single, overriding rule regarding what is supposed to be considered for inclusion in the exclusive club is each candidate's play on the field. But as insight and opinions on modern players are impacted by the ubiquitous voice of social media and other paths of information, considerations by selectors seem to have been impacted by elements beyond what actually happens on the field.

During discussions with selectors during the last few months, it is clear that the prolific career of Owens will be balanced against controversial acts and actions that occurred off the field. Even Favre, who should be a slam dunk first ballot inductee, collected detractors during his extended farewell tour to

Giants aim to build on lead

Don't look now, but the New York Giants' Week 12 game against Washington suddenly became a lot more interesting.

Although Washington (4-6) was destroyed by Carolina 44-16 and the Giants were on a bye in Week 11, the dominoes have fallen in such a way where their game at FedEx Field this Sunday will determine whether the Giants (5-5) remain a full game in first place in the division.

If the Giants win, they'll improve to 6-5, their grip on first place in the division becoming more secure as a win will give them the head-tohead tiebreaker over their oldest rival.

If they lose, Washington would move ahead of New York based on a better division record (2-1) to the Giants'

"There's definitely a lot to play for right now," center Weston Richburg said. "These next six games are crucial to our postseason destiny, so it's very important to focus on each one as our most important game of season."

The last time the Giants played in a post-Thanksgiving game that meant anything was in 2012 when they saw their 6-4 record morph into a 9-7 record which, unlike the previous season, wasn't good enough to get them into the postseason.

Head coach Tom Coughlin's message to his players is simple: forget about the first 10 games and take each remaining game one at a time.

'Six-game season, that's exactly what it is. Every game is a critical game. We are relevant and now we've got to do something about it," Coughlin said. "Finish — that word



finish. We've got to be playing at our best in all three phases with no lapses, and that's

where I'd like to see us go." Meanwhile at the Giants camp, safeties coach David Merritt didn't hesitate when asked for his assessment of Landon Collins' play through

"Rookie," he said, adding, "Right now as a rookie, to go through the NFL as a starter, to see all of the concepts, and the speed of the game, he's coming along very slowly."

"I just told him, 'Hey those opportunities don't come around too often, so you have to learn from it, and let's move on to the next one.

less of draft pedigree, and reminded reporters that Kenny Phillips, a first-round pick, was a subpar player for most of his rookie season.
