Bills release Maine native Mulligan

Enfield native Matthew Mulligan was released by the NFL's Buffalo Bills on Tuesday.

The Bills elevated tight end Nick O'Leary from the practice squad to the 53-man roster to replace the 30-yearold Mulligan, a former University of Maine

standout. O'Leary, the grandson of golf legend Jack Nicklaus, was selected by the Bills in the sixth round of the 2015 NFL Draft out of Florida State.

Mulligan, a 6-foot-4, 267pound blocking tight end, previously played for coach Rex Ryan for three seasons (2009-2011) as a member of the New York Jets. He had started five games this season and had made one catch for two yards.

After being signed at the end of June, Mulligan earned Buffalo's No. 2 tight end job and wound up playing in 26 percent of the Bills' offensive snaps.

Mulligan, who was a high school basketball, soccer and tennis player at Penobscot Valley High School in Howland, which did not field a football team, is in his seventh NFL season.

He has played for seven different teams — the Jets, St. Louis rams (2012), New England Patriots (2013), Chicago Bears (2014), Arizona Cardinals (2014), Tennessee Titans (2014) and the Bills.

Mulligan has appeared in 81 career NFL games, in-

cluding 31 starts. He has made 17 receptions for 162 yards and two touchdowns.
