Manning was not expected to practice Wednesday or be part of the active roster for Monday night's game against the Cincinnati Bengals so he can focus on recovering from a torn plantar fascia.

Head coach Gary Kubiak notified the team Wednesday morning of the situation. Manning had hoped to practice this week.

The Broncos (10-4) have dropped back-to-back games and have not scored in the second half in the last three games.

### Beckham loses suspension appeal

The NFL upheld New York Giants wide receiver Odell Beckham Jr.'s one-game suspension for multiple on-field confrontations against Carolina Panthers cornerback Josh Norman.

The appeal was heard Wednesday in New York by James Thrash, a former NFL wide receiver in his first year working with the league. Beckham will miss the Giants' road game against the Minnesota Vikings on Sunday night.

NFL official spokesperson Michael Signora announced the suspension on Monday after Beckham had three

personal fouls called against him during the Giants' 38-35 loss to the Panthers at MetLife Stadium on Sunday. The suspension is for "multiple violations of safety-related playing rules."

"Acts that jeopardize the safety of players or expose them to unnecessary risk cannot be tolerated," NFL vice president of football operations Merton Hanks said in his letter to Beckham on Monday.

Beckham has 91 catches for 1,396 yards and 13 touchdowns this season.

"I appealed my suspension because it is a right granted to all players under the NFL's CBA and because I owe it to my teammates to do everything I can to be on the field this week," Beckham said in a statement. "Regardless of the outcome of my appeal, I apologize for my actions on Sunday. I work hard to be great and accepting the Blessing of having the physical skills to play at this level brings the responsibility to conduct myself in a certain way on and off the field.

"Sportsmanship and respecting the game are as important as blocking, running routes and catching the football. I dropped the ball on sportsmanship on Sunday. I apologize to my teammates, the Giants organization, and to all fans of the NFL."

The competitive banter between Beckham and Norman escalated to the point of multiple physical confrontations.

Beckham delivered a deliberate shot to the helmet of Norman after the play was

over in one incident and they repeatedly were shoving and wrestling with each other.

On one drive, Beckham was flagged twice for unnecessary roughness and Norman also drew an unnecessary roughness penalty.

Under the Collective Bargaining Agreement, the suspension may be appealed within three business days. Appeals are heard and decided by either Derrick Brooks or James Thrash. The two former NFL players are the officers jointly appointed and compensated by the NFL and NFL Players Association to decide appeals of on-field player discipline.

During the suspension, Beckham will not be permitted to attend team meetings and functions, attend or watch practices, appear at the club's facilities for any reason, attend press conferences, appear at the team's Dec. 27 game or have contact with any club personnel except to arrange off-site medical treatment or rehabilitation.

Beckham will be reinstated on Monday, Dec. 28.

### Hali has surgery for broken thumb

Kansas City Chiefs linebacker Tamba Hali broke his thumb in last Sunday's game against the Baltimore Ravens, head coach Andy Reid confirmed Wednesday.

Hali underwent surgery on Tuesday and his status is undetermined for this Sunday's game against the Cleveland Browns at Arrowhead Stadium.

Hali, who was named to

the Pro Bowl on Tuesday, has three small screws in his thumb and is wearing a splint.

### Eifert remains in concussion protocol

Cincinnati Bengals tight end Tyler Eifert remains in concussion protocol and may miss Monday night's game against the Denver Broncos.

NFL Media's Rand Getlin reported Eifert will not play, but the Cincinnati Enquirer reported the Bengals have not ruled out the Pro Bowl tight end for the game at Denver.

Eifert missed last Sunday's game against the San Francisco 49ers due to the concussion. An Enquirer team source indicated Eifert may move out of protocol as soon as Thursday.

Eifert left in the first half of the Dec. 13 loss to Pittsburgh after taking a hit from Steelers safety Mike Mitchell, who was fined \$23,152 for the play.

Eifert, 25, worked out on the side of practice on Wednesday. He has career highs in receptions (48), yards (564) and touchdowns (12) this season.

### Hoyer practices, still in concussion protocol

Houston Texans quarterback Brian Hoyer returned to practice on a limited basis Wednesday, but he remains under the NFL concussion protocol.

Hoyer's playing status is still in doubt for Sunday's game against the Tennessee Titans.

"The balance makes us real tough to guard," Olynyk said. "You can't key in on one person when everyone's scoring. Guys are making shots and sharing the ball, and when we do that, we're tough. I think that's the way we have to play."

"Obviously, when we've played like that, we've usu-

ally won," Stevens said.

The Hornets (15-13) shot just 35.8 percent from the field and committed 17 turnovers in a woeful offensive night. They have now lost three straight and five of their last six.

"The recurring theme for us when we haven't played well in this stretch has been first-quarter turnovers, which have led to us getting off to really poor starts," Hornets coach Steve Clifford said. "The same thing happened in Orlando.

The same thing happened in Washington. It was the same thing tonight. You can't get past turning the ball over. It leads directly to baskets."

Rookie forward Frank Kaminsky came off the bench to lead the Hornets with a career-high 23 points. Guard Nicolas Batum scored 17 and guards Jeremy Lin and Jeremy Lamb had 12 each. Guard Kemba Walker finished with 10 points on 4-of-12 shooting from the floor with four turnovers.

"We're committing a lot of turnovers and not getting back on defense," Kaminsky said. "A lot of it is energy and effort plays, things that we were doing earlier in the season. We have to get back to it. We've got to stop turning the ball over and play better defense."

Head Classic on Wednesday with a 69-51 spanking of Auburn at the Stan Sheriff Center in Honolulu.

Five players scored in double figures for the balanced Crimson (5-6), led by 14 points from freshman guard Corey Johnson. Forwards Zena Edosomwan and Evan Cummins contributed 13 each and forward Agunwa Okolie had 11 points. Off the bench, forward Patrick Steeves chipped in 10 points and seven rebounds.

Forward Cinmeon Bowers scored a game-high 17 points off the bench for the Tigers (6-4) and reserve guard Bryce Brown tacked on 13. Forward Tyler Harris finished with a 12-point, 12-rebound double-double.

Harvard took command quickly with a 13-0 spurt, capped by Johnson's 3-pointer with 14:27 left in the first half that gave it a 17-4 lead. It led 40-29 at halftime and pushed the margin as high as 20 when Steeves sank a jumper with 11:45 remaining.

The Crimson converted 47.2 percent of their shots from the field, including a solid 8 of 21 on 3-pointers, and drew assists on 15 of their 25 buckets.

The Tigers shot just 30.2 percent from the floor, going 6 of 25 on 3-pointers.

### UConn 99, CCSU 52

Graduate transfer forward Shonn Miller scored a season-high 25 points and sophomore swingman Daniel Hamilton recorded his first collegiate triple-double as Connecticut crushed Central Connecticut 99-52 on Wednesday afternoon at XL Center in Hartford, Conn.

Hamilton finished with 11 points, 11 rebounds (all defensive) and 11 assists as UConn (8-3) recorded its third consecutive victory.

Hamilton had only two points at halftime and the home crowd clapped in anticipation every time he touched the ball after he reached seven points. The triple finally came with 6:31 left when he grabbed his third steal and raced to a dunk.

Miller finished with 10 field goals, six on assists by Hamilton. Former Husky Shabazz Napier (14 points, 11 rebounds, 10 assists) had UConn's last previous triple-double against Yale on Nov. 11, 2013.

Central Connecticut (1-9) was led guard Austin Nehls with 16 points.

UConn was playing its first game since losing junior center Amida Brimah to a broken finger. Brimah is expected to have surgery on Thursday and miss 6-8 weeks. UConn coach Kevin Ollie started senior forward Phillip Nolan in place of Brimah, who averages three blocked shots. Nolan scored two points.
