Arrest warrant issued for **Browns WR Gordon**

An arrest warrant has been issued for suspended Cleveland Browns wide receiver Josh Gordon in a child paternity case.

The case stems from a made complaint Cuyahoga County (Ohio) Juvenile Court from Christina Lockhart of Maple Heights, which is outside Cleveland. She claims Gordon is the father of her now 1-year-old daughter, according Cleveland.com.

The complaint against Gordon was first filed in July

Lions RB Abdullah placed on IR

The Detroit Lions placed running back Ameer Abdullah on injured reserve after he injured his left foot in Sunday's 16-15 loss to the Tennessee Titans.

Abdullah, the Lions' leading rusher with 101 yards on 18 carries this season, hobbled off the field after a 24quarter. He has caught five passes for 57 yards and a touchdown.

Initial X-rays on the foot showed no broken bones but Abdullah went to Charlotte, N.C., on Tuesday for a second opinion with specialist Dr. Robert Anderson, according to ESPN.

Jaguars RB Ivory returns to practice

Jacksonville Jaguars running back Chris Ivory, who missed the first two games after taking an emergency trip to the hospital before to practice as a limited participant.


Ivory hasn't practiced since Sept. 9 and missed the games against the Green Bay Packers and San Diego Chargers with what the team called a "medical issue.

Ivory was limited in practice leading into the season opener because of a calf problem. He was hospitalized just hours before the season opener against the Packers. He underwent tests and treatment and was released two days later.

Bears' sign RB Mostert, LB Powell to practice squad

Chicago Bears signed running back Raheem Mostert to the active roster and linebacker Ronald Powell to the practice

Mostert appeared in 11 games last season, combining to return 19 kickoffs for 530 yards while splitting time between the Cleveland Browns, Baltimore Ravens and Miami Dolphins. He was originally signed by the Philadelphia Eagles as an undrafted rookie out of Purdue last year.

Alford was a 10-time letterwinner in soccer, basketball and outdoor track at Orono. On the soccer pitch, she helped the Red Riots make three straight playoff appearances from 2001-03 and scored 20 or more goals in her junior and senior sea-

The two-time All-PVC and all-region first-teamer, who was selected to the all-state first team as a senior, departed as Orono's career scoring leader.

Alford, who was a defensive force and a two-year starter in basketball, excelled on the track. She won the 100, 200 and 400 meters in 2004 and still holds the 400 state record (58.74 seconds) to help Orono capture two state

runner-up plaques.

Alford ran at Brandeis University, where she earned her undergraduate degree, and gained a master's degree at the University of Michigan. She works in the Maine Department of Health and Human Servic-

Schmidt earned varsity letters in soccer, crosscountry, basketball and softball for the Red Riots. She was a two-year basketball captain who helped the team make two tourney appearances.

Schmidt was an All-PVC selection at guard for threestraight seasons and in 1988 earned Bangor Daily News All-Maine second-team recognition. She became Orono's first female career 1,000-point scorer and remains one of only three to achieve that feat.

Schmidt attended the University of Kansas, where she played basketball as a freshman. She graduated with a degree in civil engineering in 1993 and has worked in that field since 1998 in Colo-

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Work made Brissett an instant leader at N.C. State, and it won him respect this summer in New England. The product of it all will be cast under harsh light Thursday night, on national television against J.J. Watt, Jadeveon Clowney and the Houston

"The spotlight is not going to be something that scares him, I'll tell you that," Doeren nerves. It's not going to be something that is going to hurt him. It's almost the opposite. The guy was the ultimate competitor. He loved the big stage. Some of his best games were our biggest

Nothing could fully prepare a third-round rookie to hold the reins of the NFL's most successful franchise with three days' notice. Brissett, though, has unique experience that could help. He hasn't quite been here before, but he's been close.

As a freshman backup at William T. Dwyer High, Brissett replaced the injured starter in a playoff game against Booker T. Washington, the best team in the state and one of the best in the nation. Daniels expected little from Brissett, then a chunky, short 15-year-old. He completed all 12 passes he attempted and nearly led Dwyer to a comeback upset.

"It was like he had taken every rep that year and night before games, he wrote said. "I'm sure he'll have wasn't fazed at all," Daniels an individual note to each one said. "We didn't know what of his offensive teammates, deto expect. We were just as shocked as anybody at how cool and calm he was as a freshman.'

sett continued his quiet study. When Brissett entered Sunday in the second quarter, Daniels thought he saw him look nervous for the first time. He completed 6 of 9 passes for 92 yards, mostly screens and short passes as the Patriots sought to protect a big lead.
