Giants hoping to knock off Patriots Sunday

The New York Giants denied New England a chance at history in Super Bowl XLII and will try to end another perfect season for the visiting Patriots when the teams meet on Sunday at New Jersey's MetLife Stadium (4:25 p.m.,

CBS-TV). The NFC East-leading Giants have won the past three matchups against New England, including a pair of lastminute victories in the Super Bowl.

"We've always had very, very close games against them even when we've won," said quarterback Tom Brady, who has guided the Patriots to an 8-0 start. "We just haven't won as many of them as I would've liked to have won.'

New England is averaging a league-high 34.5 points and owns a three-game lead over the New York Jets atop the AFC East. The Giants rebounded from a 52-49 loss in New Orleans with a 32-18 victory at Tampa Bay a week ago in defensive end Jason Pierre-Paul's season debut to maintain a halfgame edge over Philadelphia in the NFC East.

"They're undefeated,"

Pierre-Paul said of the Patriots, "but they've got to come

through here first. ABOUT THE PATRI-**OTS (8-0):** Brady, who came up a yard shy of his sixth 300-yard game in last week's 27-10 win over Washington, has thrown for 22 touchdowns versus only two interceptions and owns a league-best 113.5 passer rating. Wideout Julian Edelman (57 receptions) and tight end Rob Gronkowski (44) each have seven touchdown catches, but New England suffered a costly loss when two-way running back Dion Lewis suffered a season-ending knee injury last week. The Patriots' defense is permitting only 17.9 points per game and is tied with St. Louis for second in the league with 27 sacks.

ABOUT THE GIANTS (5-4): New York's offense has been erratic, with Manning throwing for 213 yards or fewer in four of the last six games but mixing in a monster 441-yard performance and a 350-yard, sixtouchdown outing in that span. Odell Beckham Jr. has at least seven catches in six of his nine starts and is coming off back-to-back 100-yard Shane Vereen has 34 receptions out of the backfield.

FanDuel stops taking money in NY

NEW YORK — Daily fantasy sports site FanDuel said on Friday it stopped taking new deposits in New York after the state's attorney general declared the games to be illegal gambling.

New York Attorney General Eric Schneiderman sent cease and desist letters this week to daily fantasy sports market leaders FanDuel and DraftKings, demanding that they stop taking money from players in the state.

Both companies filed lawsuits in New York state court on Friday, contesting the order and asking the court to rule the games are legal.

While FanDuel stopped taking new money from New Yorkers, it said players who had deposited money previously would be able play in

would be able to continue to take action against the comwithdraw from their ac-

On Tuesday, the state attorney general's office declared the games against state law because customers "are clearly placing bets on events outside of their control or influence, specifically on the real-game performance of professional athletes.

DraftKings said in its lawsuit that New York Attorney General Eric Schneiderman was "using strong-arm tactics and defying the rule of law," accusing him of acting as judge, jury and executioner of the companies.

New York has more daily fantasy sports players than any other U.S. state, according to Eilers Research, so being forced to shut down there could cripple the fastgrowing, multibillion-dollar handful of exceptions, inindustry.

DraftKings accused said users in New York authority by threatening to amending the state's Consti-

pany's payment processors, Vantiv Inc and PayPal Holdings Inc , if they did not stop working with DraftKings.

Vantiv has stopped processing payments for DraftKings, the fantasy sports company said in its lawsuit. Pay-Pal is still processing payments, pending developments in New York, a spokeswoman said.

The attorney general's declaration that daily fantasy sports is gambling, if correct, would make it "nearly impossible" for New York's legislature to pass a law allowing the games, said Bennett Liebman, former New York state deputy secretary

for gaming and racing. New York's Constitution prohibits gambling though the state has carved out a cluding horse racing and the state lottery. But each of

tution, a years-long process that requires approval of legislation by two successive legislatures, followed by a public vote, he said.

About a hundred people, including a significant number of daily fantasy sports site workers, protested Schneiderman's decision on Friday outside his office.

Jason Green, 35, visiting from Nashville for a daily fantasy sports conference this weekend, came to the protest after reading the cease and desist letters.

"Regulation is one thing, but this isn't regulation just one guy making a decision," he said. "There's a lot of misinformation out there and hopefully we've shown that people should be allowed to keep playing.'

De La Hoya said Alvarez was not ready to beat the defensive wizard but the boxer wanted the match, wanted to test himself and had no regrets despite losing his WBC and WBA super welterweight titles to the American.

The promoter knows Cotto could emerge victorious, but that does not stop him from dreaming big about a clash against Kazakhstan knockout artist Gennady Golovkin, another world middleweight title holder.

De La Hoya believes that boxing thrives when the best take on the best and said he could see Alvarez in a championship slugfest against unbeaten Golovkin within a year or 18 months.

"It's interesting to see how long we're going to take to build, the need for it to marinate just a bit," he said. "I like my meat medium rare. I'm not a guy who likes to over cook my meat.

"In the meantime, Triple G (Golovkin) is now fighting with tough guys, Canelo is fighting with tough guys. They might lose, they might win. That's the risk we have to take. The vision, the game plan, is to have them meet, sooner than later.

"It will be like two Mack trucks colliding. It will be the next super fight for the sport of boxing.'

De La Hoya said fight fans love the big hitters and particularly bemoaned a lack of excitement in the heavyweight ranks. But the promoter believes a renaissance could be born at the 2016 Rio Olympics.

"The Olympics are important to identifying the next superstars.

We've had our struggles in the past Olympics," De La Hoya said about poor U.S. results at recent Games, "which I blame on the Olympic system, which has been changed now back to the old scoring system."

Now instead of computerized punch counts, which reward volume, ringside judges will score along the lines of professional boxing to better integrate technique and punching power into the judging.

He went so far as to suggest to editors of Ring Magazine, the Bible of Boxing which is owned by Golden Boy Promotions, that Rousey grace a recent controversial cover of the magazine.

"Ronda Rousey is the hottest athlete right now. She's the 'It Girl'. The fact is that she wants to be a world champion in boxing, she's mentioned it. She wants to

"When Ronda Rousey is ready to become a boxer, I told her Golden Boy Promotions is ready to welcome her with open arms," said De La Hoya.

away one of the most fundamental ways to score goals," said Ball. "It's part of the game."

The coaches also stressed that concussions often result from players whacking their heads together while trying to head a ball, not the actual heading of the ball.

"I have never seen a head injury or concussion result from someone heading the ball. Typically, you get a head injury from two players cracking heads, an elbow hitting a head or the head hitting the ground when they land," Ball said.

Medical experts also differ on how the most concus-

sions occur. In an article by BBC health reporter Michelle Roberts from 2011, Dr. Michael Lipton of the Montefiore Medical Center in New York discovered during a clinical trial that players who headed the ball 1,000 or more times a year showed signs of mild traumatic brain injury on their brain scans. There were 32 volun-

But Dr. Andrew Rutherford from the School of Psychology at Keele University, who had researched the possible damage created by heading for several years, wasn't convinced by the findings.

teers involved.

Like Ball, Rutherford suspected most head trauma was created by the clashing of heads.

All four coaches were adamant that youngsters must be taught proper heading technique.

Atherley has used a soft Nerf ball to teach heading to youngsters, and Shannon said he has used balloons and beach balls to instruct youngsters the proper technique without sustaining head trauma.

Gettler said he likes to use underinflated balls when his team is doing a heading drill because it reduces the head trauma.

He also prefers an underinflated ball during games because it promotes skill.

"The ball should be headed with the hairline on the forehead and players should attack the ball to establish the force on the ball rather than allow the force of the ball to impact them," said Atherley.

He has observed that youngsters can be apprehensive about heading so they wind up "closing their eyes and contacting the ball with the wrong part of the head: the top of their head or their nose.

He said by using a Nerf ball, it gives the youngsters "a lot more confidence"

I'm so sorry if a lot of you can't handle being talked to direct.'
