The Houston Rockets fired head coach Kevin McHale on Wednesday after a 4-7 start this season.

General manager Daryl Morey also announced that assistant J.B. Bickerstaff will take over as interim head coach. Houston hosts the Portland Trail Blazers on Wednesday night.

"The team was not responding to Kevin," Morey said Wednesday. "There is no time in the West.

"It's not just losing. It's not just 4-7. It's the way we're losing, by how much, by how the team is responding. It was tough. This is not something we take lightly. This is a decision we thought about a long time. We knew we were under the gun."

The Rockets, with the league's second-worst defen-

prompted a players-only straight trips to the playoffs never seen my team play as meeting on Tuesday morning, following a 111-95 loss to the Boston Celtics on Monday night.

We were starting to address some of the issues that were the reason I was let go," McHale told the Houston Chronicle after his firing. "We just weren't playing with any juice, with any rhythm. The 57-year-old McHale signed a three-year contract extension last December, worth more than \$12 million guaranteed.

"J.B. is great with players, great with schemes, and he's been preparing for this his whole life," Morey told USA TODAY Sports. "He obviously has a great pedigree, and was critical to our winning over the last four years with Kevin. RBIs and a .284 lifetime batting average. He has hit 445 of his homers since joining the Red Sox in 2003. His 447 home runs as a designated hitter are the most in history

Ortiz stands third in franchise history in home runs behind Ted Williams (521) and Carl Yastrzemski (452). He ranks 27th on the all-time home run list, just one away from tying Hall of Famer Eddie Murray.

"I'm really proud of what I had accomplished through the years," Ortiz said. "I'm very thankful for having fans like you guys who have supported me through my career. I wish I could play another 40 years to have you guys behind me, but it doesn't work that way.

Ortiz led the Red Sox to three World Series championships in 2004, 2007 and 2013. He owns the best World Series batting average (.455), on-base percentage (.576) and slugging percentage (.795) for players in the Fall Classic. He was named MVP of the 2013 World Series.

"It is difficult to adequately convey what David Ortiz has meant to the Boston Red Sox," Red Sox owner John Henry said in a statement. "For his teammates, he has been the one constant force underpinning what it means to play for this organization and making it fun. For the fans, he has been the one consis-

The school sued the NCAA over the policy, but agreed in a 2007 settlement to retire the name and logo if it could not obtain support special session.

from two namesake tribes. One tribe approved, but the second never voted.

The university prepared to retire the name and logo, but state lawmakers in 2011 approved a law requiring the school to retain them only to repeal the law in a

Nickname supporters then gathered enough signatures to force a statewide referendum. After intense lobbying on both sides, residents voted in June 2012 to retire the nick name and logo.

The university went with no nickname as part of a transition.
