Folk singer Glenn Yarbrough dies at 86

LOS ANGELES — Glenn Yarbrough, the American folk singer best known for his work with the popular trio the Limelites in the early 1960s and his solo hit single "Baby the Rain Must Fall," has died at the age of 86.

Yarbrough, lead singer and guitarist of the original group that also featured Alex Hassilev and Lou Gottlieb, passed away on Thursday night surrounded by friends and family members, his daughter Holly Yarbrough Burnett said in a post on Facebook.

"Dad was listening to Baby the Rain Must Fall when his breaths spaced out and he drifted up and out during the last chorus — catching a ride on the Perseids to his next Great Adventure. It was a very good death," Yarbrough Burnett wrote.

Yarbrough Burnett did not specify a cause of death in the post. But in May she wrote that her father had been suffering from chronic obstructive pulmonary disease and

dementia, and he had been in hospice care in recent months. He died at her home in Nashville.

Yarbrough was born on Jan. 20, 1930, in Milwaukee but largely grew up in New York City, where he sang in the church choir.

He studied philosophy at St. John's College in Annapolis, Maryland, but decided to embark on a career as a folk singer after attending a Woody Guthrie concert at the school.

After serving in the Korean War, Yarbrough moved to Aspen, Colorado, where he had purchased a ski lodge with Hassilev called The Limelite that would lend its name to the trio.

Yarbrough left the group in 1963 and released a series of solo songs and albums, including "Baby the Rain Must Fall," title song of a 1965 film starring Steve McQueen and Lee Remick.

Yarbrough, who had a love for the sea, spent much of the next several decades sailing but reunited periodically with the band for reunion tours.

Marion Barry, son of former D.C. mayor, dies

WASHINGTON — Marion Christopher Barry, son of the late D.C. mayor Marion Barry and a former candidate for the D.C. city council, has died, according to relatives and news reports. He was 36.

The younger Barry died of an apparent drug overdose, according to reports. His girlfriend found him, and he was taken to George Washington University Hospital.

Barry had struggled with drug use. He ran unsuccessfully for the Ward 8 council seat last year after his father died.

Barry had brushes with the law, including charges related to an alleged outburst at a D.C. bank branch.

Reached by phone on Sunday morning, Cora Masters Barry, widow of Marion Barry, said she was not prepared to talk about the younger Barry's death. "It is very difficult for me right now," she said.

Trayon White, the Democratic nominee for the Ward 8 council seat, and a protege

of the senior Barry, called Marion Christopher Barry a friend who will be missed.

"Chris was like a brother to me. He cared about the community. He had a lot of things that he wanted to work on to better the community," White said.

White, the younger Barry and a dozen others had run to fill the council vacancy left by Marion Barry's death in November 2014. LaRuby May won that special election. But in the election this year for a full, four-year term to succeed the former mayor, the younger Barry had endorsed White, who prevailed in the Democratic primary.

Christopher Barry had started a construction firm last year, he said in an interview with The Post in the fall. He said he was trying to form a community business enterprise, a minority firm that could compete for city contracts.

White said Barry was on the site of one of his construction projects in Southeast as late as Saturday.

"Chris is going to be missed by me and others who knew him," White said.
