June was a 1940 graduate of the Madawaska Training School and received her third year degree in 1954 from Fort Kent Normal School. She began her teaching career at the age of 18 in the Violette Settlements, in Fort Kent, where she taught 38 students, K-8th, in a one-room school house. Due to the distance from her home, she boarded at one of the student's home during the week and went home (South Perley Brook) on weekends. After paying for her room and board, and the expense of nylon stockings, which got ruined on the old school benches, nothing much was left from her pay. Apparently this did not deter her enthusiasm for teaching because she continued as a teacher of the first grade at the St. Louis school, K through the 3rd grade at Baxter Street school and finished her career as first grade teacher at the Market Street school. All of these schools were in the Fort Kent area. June taught for a total of 31 years. After her retirement, former students came up to her and thanked her and talked about the many wonderful memories they had of her and how she made learning fun for them. Though she did not have children of her own, she considered them all her children. Night after night, she would draw free hand pictures for the kids to color, or exercises to reinforce what she had taught them that day. Most of these years were prior to duplicating machines, and definitely before computers and copying machines. A few years ago, her nursery rhymes that she drew while teaching at the Baxter Street school were still in existence in an ele-

mentary school classroom.

Of course they were re-

touched and laminated, but

they were her original free

hand drawings. Her dedica-

tion and concern for her stu-

dents was always a priority,

it even extended to making

sure that mittens and socks

were made available to

those in need. Anyone hear-

ing June talk about teaching,

realized how she truly loved

what she had chosen for a

career. After retirement, she taught in the Fort Kent Adult Education program for two years and briefly substitute taught. For twenty years, June and her husband, Lorenzo, enjoyed their 6 months stay in Florida during the winter months and their camp in Eagle Lake in the summertime. She loved to go fishing and dancing with him, and liked to entertain the relatives and friends that stopped by to visit them including their ten godchildren!

June was a lifetime VFW Auxilliary member and held the position of President and Chair of all offices at one time or another. She also was a lifetime member in the following: Ladies of Ste. Anne, University of Maine at Fort Kent Alumni Association, and Disabled Veteran Auxilliary, June belonged to the Maine Retirement Association, NEA, and was a member of the Fort Kent Senior Citizens' Club.

June quietly contributed to many charitable organizations, especially those that involved children in need. She loved to listen to the EWTN channel, which was a great comfort and companion to her after the death of her husband.



Founder of New York safari park trampled to death by antelope

NEW YORK — The 81-year-old founder of a safari park in western New York state was trampled to death by an antelope that had escaped its pen, the Wyoming County Sheriff's Office said on Tuesday.

Hidden Valley Animal Adventure in Varysburg, New York, about 35 miles east of Buffalo, will remain closed until Wednesday after the death on Sunday of Hans Boxler, a dairy farmer who opened the tourist attraction in 2006.

On Sunday evening, when Boxler failed to return home from feeding the animals, family members searching for him found a nilgai antelope loose near its pen, its door open, the sheriff's of-

fice said. After returning the ante-

lope to its pen, family mem-

apparently been trampled by an animal.

The Monroe County Medical Examiner said his death was caused by multiple blunt-force injuries and ruled it was an accident, the sheriff's office said. "He respected the innate

nature of his animals, and therefore followed a routine daily, which is why this tragic accident is such a shock. We will never know exactly what happened," the sheriff's office said in a statement.

Hidden Valley Animal Adventure is home to more than 200 animals from around the globe, including nilgai antelope, which are native to India and are among the largest Asian antelopes, weighing as much as 600 pounds.

The wild animal park's Facebook page features photographs of exotic animals such as camels, llamas and zebras.
