## CARLETON CLARK YOUNG, JR.

PORTLAND - Carleton Clark Young, Jr., 95, died peacefully on January 1, 2016 at a Portland health care facility. The son of Carleton Clark and Alice Brady Young, Clark was born in New York, New York on December 16, 1920. Shortly after his birth, the Young family moved to Brunswick, Maine.

Clark graduated from Brunswick High School, class of 1938, attended Governor Dummer Academy for one year and graduated from Bowdoin College, class of 1943. Throughout his high school and college years, Clark played football and was an outstanding track star. Immediately following graduation, he enlisted as an aviator in the U.S. Navy, was trained as a carrier pilot and stationed in San Diego during the war. After his discharge from the Navy, Clark earned a Master's Degree in Forestry from Yale University in 1948.

As a teenager, he spent his summers cruising timber in the woods of northern Maine and Canada. After Naval service, he joined the James W. Sewall Company as a forester and pilot managing thousands of acres of Maine timberland. His work took him on many adventures, including his piloting of a twin-engine Apache airplane from Old Town to Anchorage, Alaska. With his peers, he founded and restored an abandoned warden's camp into a recreational camp at Millimagassett Lake, one of his favorite places on earth. It has since been enjoyed by generations of family and friends of the Sewall Company. He eventually rose to Vice President of the company until his retirement in 1982.


In Old Town, Clark was an active member of the community, including many years as a member of the Old Town School Board, and, recreationally, an avid outdoorsman who loved to fish and hunt. Together with his wife of 61 years, Peggy, they raised two children. In 2001, Clark and Peggy retired permanently to Siesta Key, Florida where they had previously spent many winters. They loved to dance, walk the beach, and host their children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren. Clark was also an avid golfer for many years, achieving the ultimate goal of a 'hole-in-one.' With charm and humility, Clark connected with many people of all walks of life.

## Cinematographer Zsigmond dies at 85

Oscar-winning cinematographer Vilmos Zsigmond, revered as one of the most influential cinematographers in film history for his work on several classic films, including "Close Encounters of the Third Kind" and "The Deer Hunter," died Friday. He was 85.

The Hungarian-born Zsigmond died in Big Sur, California, from "a combination of many illnesses," said his business partner Yuri Neyman.

Among Zsigmond's most noteworthy achievements was his Oscar-winning photography on 1977's "Close Encounters of the Third Kind," written and directed by Steven Spielberg. In a 1998 interview with the Los Angeles Times, Zsigmond revealed that making that film was difficult because "we were breaking new ground."

"Before 'Close Encounters,' there were some space movies about spaceships, but nothing really that great technically that we could follow," he said. "So we had to invent."

Part of that process involved managing Spielberg's requests for bigger lighting effects: "He kept always telling me, 'I want to see an incredible amount of light coming out of the spaceship.' So we had to figure out a way to do that."

"Close Encounters" was nominated for seven other Oscars that year and became one of the films that established Spielberg as a major force on the film landscape.

Zsigmond received three other Academy Award nominations during his more than five-decade career. He was nominated for 1978's "The Deer Hunter," 1984's "The River" and 2006's "The Black Dahlia." He won an Emmy for the 1992 miniseries "Stalin," and was nominated for 2001's "The Mists of Avalon."

He continued to work well into his later years, shooting several episodes of the comedy "The Mindy Project" from 2012 to 2014 as well as many other films that have yet to be released.

In a phone interview with the Times, Neyman, who, along with Zsigmond, co-founded the Global Cinematography Institute, remem-

bered his friend's influence on the industry.

"He taught people how to look and think differently," Neyman said. "He was unique at a time when he was just in independent cinema, before all the awards. He changed how people view cinematography."

Steven Poster, president of the International Cinematographers Guild, agreed. The group in 2003 voted Zsigmond one of the 10 most influential cinematographers of all time.

"Vilmos was an inspiration and mentor to many of us," Poster said in a statement on behalf of the organization, to which Zsigmond also belonged. "We all knew what a giant he was as an artist at the time. But working up close with him, I also learned about perseverance and an obligation to the story."

Zsigmond was born June 16, 1930, in Szeged, Hungary. As a student studying cinema at the Budapest Film School, he began his career documenting the Hungarian revolution of 1956.

He and fellow classmate Laszlo Kovacs hid a borrowed 35-millimeter camera from their school in a shopping bag with a hole cut out for the lens and shot footage of the Soviet invasion. Armed with about 30,000 feet of film hidden in potato sacks, Kovacs and Zsigmond fled across the Austria-Hungary border, which was patrolled by Russian soldiers. They arrived in the United States as political refugees in early 1957 and sold the footage to CBS for a network documentary on the revolution narrated by Walter Cronkite. This journey is documented in the 2008 film "No Subtitles Necessary: Laszlo & Vilmos."

Kovacs established his own distinguished career, earning accolades for photographing several films, including "Easy Rider" and "New York, New York."

In a 2005 interview with the Times, Zsigmond discussed the importance of the cinematographer's role in Hollywood.

"The cinematographer helps to tell the story in a visual way," he said. "I don't really depend on dialogue. I consider film a visual art, and for me, telling the story visually is more important than telling the story with words and dialogue."

## Body of singer Craig Strickland recovered

Craig Strickland, lead singer of the country-rock band Backroad Anthem, who was reported missing on Dec. 27 after going on a duck hunt, has been found dead in Oklahoma, officials and his wife said on Monday.

"He is safe with his Father in Heaven," his wife, Helen Strickland, tweeted.

The body of the 29-year-old singer was found by Kaw Lake in northern Oklahoma in an area known as Bear Creek Cove, according to the Oklahoma Highway Patrol.

Strickland, of Springdale, Arkansas, had gone duck hunting with his friend Chase Marland of Marlow, Oklahoma, despite the severe winter storm that hit the Midwest, officials said. Their capsized boat was found on Dec. 28, and Marland's body was found the same day.

More than 30 people have died in the U.S. Midwest after days of downpours that pushed the Mississippi and smaller rivers over their banks in several states during the holiday period.



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
