Wall Street rallied sharply on Monday, juiced by a jump in Apple shares and gains from energy stocks that were backed by stronger oil prices.

Apple shares finished up 3.7 percent after Warren Buffett's Berkshire Hathaway reported a stake worth about \$1 billion in the iPhone maker. The stock, which had lost about one-fifth of its value in the past month, gave the biggest boost to the three indexes.

The S&P energy sector gained 1.6 percent as oil prices hit sixmonth highs. Crude prices were supported by worries about global supply outages and as long-time bear Goldman Sachs sounded more positive on the market.

Oil prices have recovered some ground after touching 12-year lows earlier in 2016, with volatility in oil causing jitters in other mar-

"With oil prices being back up into that \$40 range, some of the downside that was associated with the energy market ... is more subdued at these current prices, or at least held at bay, and the ripple effects from that are also held at bay," said Jason Pride, director of investment strategy at Glenmede Investment and Wealth Management in Philadelphia.

The Dow Jones industrial average rose 175.39 points, or 1 percent, to 17,710.71, the S&P 500 gained 20.05 points, or 0.98 percent, to 2,066.66 and the Nasdaq Composite added 57.78 points, or 1.22 percent,

to 4,775.46. All 10 major S&P 500 sectors finished higher, led by materials and energy.

Last week, the Dow and S&P 500 fell for a third straight week, while the Nasdaq's losing streak hit four weeks.

"Oil is the catalyst, but the move today wouldn't have been this big if stocks had not been this weak lately," said Jim Paulsen, chief investment strategist at Wells Capital Management in Minneapolis.

Gloomy quarterly reports from retailers had clouded the market last week. The retail sector is in focus again, with Wal-Mart, Home Depot and Target set to report results this week

The S&P 500 is up just over 1 percent this year. While the benchmark index has risen about 14 percent since February lows, the rally fizzled out in the last few weeks amid mixed corporate earnings and economic data.
