



ATCHMAN is alternative treatment

Dear Dr. Roach: I have been diagnosed with a-fib. For various reasons, it has been determined that I should not be on blood thinners for any sustained length of time (neither Coumadin nor the more recent generation). My cardiologist has suggested that a good alternative in my case might be the WATCHMAN device, which involves surgery. This would put me on blood thinners a month before surgery and up to six months after, but not indefinitely. I know that the device has been in use in Europe for about eight years but only recently has been approved by the Food and Drug Administration and Medicare. I am wondering what you can tell me about this option. Beyond the normal risk of any surgery, is it a better option than just a regimen of aspirin for someone with a-fib who can't be on blood thinners indefinitely? --M.H.

TO YOUR GOOD HEALTH

Atrial fibrillation — the lack of an organized rhythm in the atria, the small chambers in the heart that the blood flows into before going to the ventricles — may cause several problems, but the most worrisome is a blood clot. It can embolize (break off into the blood) and cause damage, especially to the brain, where it causes a stroke. The part of the heart where blood clots form is called the left atrial appendage. The WATCHMAN device is one of several (but the only FDA-approved one, as of this writing) designed to block off the appendage. It is about as successful at preventing stroke as medication therapy, such as rin (Coumadin) or dabigatran (Pradaxa).

In fact, lowering uric acid levels suddenly can make an acute attack worse. so I can't recommend tart cherries (or juice, or extract)

Giving it your all

Cy the Cynic says you should always give 100 percent — unless you're at the Red Cross donating blood. If you have two 50-50 chances for a contract, arrange to try both. You won't have a 100 percent chance of success but will be about a 3-to-1 favorite.

At today's slam, East takes the ace of hearts and returns a heart to South's king. South has 10 tricks: five trumps, two hearts, two clubs and a diamond. He can get two more if diamond finesses work, or if he guesses the queen of clubs, or if the A-K of clubs drop the queen.

How does South maximize his chances?

12 TRICKS

South can start by taking the K-J of \$\hspace 842\$ trumps and the K-A of clubs. When West's queen falls, South draws trumps and takes his 12 tricks, pitching a diamond on dummy's queen of hearts.

If East-West played low clubs, South would try a diamond to the queen. If the finesse won, he could draw trumps and repeat the finesse, throwing two clubs on the queen of hearts and ace of diamonds. His chances would be about 60 percent.

vulnerable. The dealer, at your right,
