Union Street Brick Church stages 'Wit'

It's hard to imagine why a playwright would set her skills on a subject as bleak as ovarian cancer - or why a local church would want to tell the story. The play, titled Wit, was written by Margaret Edson, a graduate from Smith College with a degree in Renaissance history. After that, she moved to Iowa and sold hot dogs and tended bar. So how did she come to write such a play?

According to the play's website, "In 1985 she took a job as a clerk on an oncology/AIDS unit at a research hospital in Washington. The unit was doing clinical trials of the drug AZT for AIDS patients and developing new protocols for the treatment of ovarian cancer. In her unobtrusive clerical position, Edson was able to watch the interactions of very sick patients with their caregivers, and to observe how patients coped with their illnesses and the often dehumanizing environment of a bustling hospital. She left the hospital after a year, but the experience stayed with her. She went on to intern at a philanthropic organization and do fundraising for a mental health agency, where she published her first piece of writing, a training manual on the psychosocial aspects of AIDS, Living with AIDS: Perspectives for Caregivers." After spending time in a Roman convent learning plain song and doing manual labor, she began writing a play. While working as a sales clerk in a bicycle shop, she revisited her haunting experience in health care, particularly of women with ovarian cancer who approached the almost certain death sentence with so much dignity.

That play is Wit, the story of the final hours of Vivian Bearing. In the play, Vivian is an academic superstar in the world of John Donne studies, considered the most difficult metaphysical poet to read. Her life is consumed by the structures of poetry, the fine points of the placement of a comma or the pronunciation of a diphthong.

But then Vivian is diagnosed with stage four metastatic ovarian cancer; there is no stage five. She is placed in an experimental chemotherapy protocol that is killing her, but she prides herself on her toughness in the pursuit of knowledge. As the end of her life nears, the skills and intellectual strengths she had relied on are confronted by the new emotional realities of loss, weakness, and fear. She "discovers that her expertise in literary interpretation has little to do with the real-life trauma of cancer, which cannot be addressed through scholarly research or intellectual argument." (faculty.smu).

Vivian reassesses her life and her work with a profundity and humor that are transformative -- both for her and the audience. The cultures of academia, modern medicine, and Beatrix Potter meet in Edson's Pulitzer Prize-winning play.

As Vivian says, "Now is not the time for verbal swordplay, for unlikely flights of imagination and wildly shifting perspectives, for metaphysical conceit, for wit. And nothing would be worse than a detailed scholarly analysis. Erudition. Interpretation. Complication. Now is the time for simplicity. Now is the time for, dare I say it, kindness."

Wit is being performed at the Union Street Brick Church Friday and Saturday, September 23 and 24 at 7pm, and Sunday, September 25 at 3:30 pm. The church is on the corner of Main and Union Streets in downtown Bangor. There is no admission charge and refreshments are served. 
