

Northeastern Primitive Rendezvous is part of Orrington Old Home Days celebration

ORRINGTON — The Northeastern Primitive Rendezvous will be in the fields of the historic Wiswell Farm July 15-22. As a part of Orrington's Old Home Week, hundreds of settlers, including the local Acadia Frontiersmen, set up their canvas tents and live as our ancestors did hundreds of years ago. Representing the fur traders era from 1640-1840, the participants will bring history alive and you can step into the past.

The National Rendezvous and Living History Foundation invites the public to this extraordinary encampment, the largest in the Northeast, on the three public days, Saturday and Sunday, July 16 and 17, and Wednesday, July 20. Public hours are 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Guests will be immersed in pre-1840 history as they stroll through the paths and

trails of the village. There will be programs featuring artisans, historians, musicians, tribal life and guest speakers. Settlers will be selling their authentic foods and old-fashioned merchandise outside their tents. Guests can even watch the settlers demonstrate their musket shooting and hawk and knife throwing skills!

The Wiswell Farm is located on Route 15 in Orrington. It has seen nine generations of Wiswells, from one of the earliest settlers on the banks of the Penobscot River to the present day patriarch, Henry Wiswell.

Admission is a suggested donation of \$5 per adult. This is a cash only event. Limited parking will be available on site. Additional off-site parking will be available in designated local lots. 

Pub in the Port to open in Winterport

WINTERPORT — Barbecue and live music fans in the Bangor region alike were undoubtedly disappointed to hear that 4Points BBQ & Blues, the restaurant and music venue in downtown Winterport closed suddenly in May, after five years in operation. Whether you came for the brisket, the consistent array of live music both local and national, or for both, 4Points was one of the best places to grab a bite and hear some tunes in eastern Maine.

Less than two months after 4Points finally closed its doors, however, another restaurant and live music venue will be moving into the spot, which occupies prime real estate on heavily trafficked Route 1A.

Pub in the Port, owned and operated by proprietors Hope Parker and Christopher Larrabee, held a grand opening celebration on Saturday, July 9, showing off new interior renovations that offer more space for both dining and music, a brand new menu and selection of craft beers, and music from local blues and rock band the Eric Green Party with special guest Tommy O'Connell, on the outdoor stage and patio.

According to its Facebook page, Pub in the Port will offer flatbreads, locally sourced burgers and meats, Maine caught seafood, charcuterie boards, pickle plates, hand cut French fries and other treats. Musically speaking, fans of live music can expect to see bands and artists performing every weekend on the patio

through the end of September, and inside from October through May. Other bands set for the month of July include Raven on July 15. Hours at the new restaurant will be Thursday through Sunday, opening at 3 p.m. and closing at 9 p.m., with later 11 p.m. hours on Friday and Saturday.

Pub in the Port's opening comes hot on the heels of two other shakeups and openings in downtown Winterport. The Bacon Tree, a highly popular restaurant, moved out of its former digs at 111 Main St. and into a spacious new location (formerly the home of Pairings in Maine) at 279 Main St., sharing the building with Winterport Winery and Penobscot Bay Brewing. Just a few weeks after that, Amigos, a new Mexican restaurant, opened at 111 Main St.

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
