Fly-tying classes planned by Penbosct Fly Fishers

Penobscot Fly Fishers will again offer their annual basic fly tying class. The eight week course will be held Mondays from 6-8 p.m. at the Penobscot County Conservation Association 570 North Main St. in Brewer. The classes will start on the January 4, 2016 the first Monday in January.

The course is designed to expose students to a variety of tying tools, techniques and materials in order to give them a solid foundation in this sport. The evenings will start with a discussion of the pattern that we will be tying and the materials used, followed by a demonstration of the pattern by one of our instructors. The students will then head to their vises to practice the pattern under the tutelage of our staff. There should be ample time for each student to complete a number of flies each night. The course fee is \$40 and includes all the necessary materials and the use of fly tying tools during class time. All students under 17 years of age must be accom-
