BREWER — With recent gasoline prices reaching \$3-plus per gallon, Brewer city officials are anxious.

The city locked its heating oil at \$1.62 per gallon for the winter, but must pay whatever is posted at the pump for gasoline to run city vehicles, City Manager Steve Bost said.

Fuel prices jumped to more than \$3 cross the country after Hurricane Katrina hit the Gulf Coast early last week, destroying one of the country's biggest ports and shutting down numerous refineries and a massive pipeline that supplies fuel to the Northeast.

25 years ago — Sept. 3, 1990

50 years ago — Sept. 3, 1965

BANGOR — A dinner meeting of the Rosen family circle was held at the Hotel Shelburn in New York City. There were 85 members present, representing four generations. They are descendants of Mr. and Mrs. Morris Rosen who came to Bangor in 1890 with their

family. Special tribute was paid to Sarah Rosen of Bangor in honor of her 84th birthday; to Minnie Rosen Stern, formerly of Bangor, now of Amsterdam, New York, and to Anna Rosen, wife of the late Louis I. Rosen, formerly of Bangor.

BREWER — "A Number of Things" is the "working" title of Bangor authoress Marion Flood French's third book, accepted for publication by Abingdon Press.

Miss French's forthcoming book will be a continuation of the series, "Gingham Joys" and "To Come and Go On."

The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Jewett of Brewer, she is the movie and book reviewer for the Bangor Daily News. Through the years, in addition to other staff duties, she averages two film reviews a week and reads at least four or five books each week.

Employed at the Bangor Daily News for 20 years, Miss French from time to time writes daily columns such as Lenten Windows on which her present book and the two previous ones have been based, and Vacation Corner, which is running this summer.

Mrss French is also the author of the children's book, "Mr. Bear Goes to

100 years ago — Sept. 3, 1915

BANGOR — James A. Greenacre, an old time resident of Bangor, died as his home in Union Street after a brief illness. He was 72.

Mr. Greenacre was formerly a well known produce dealer in Pickering Square in the store now occupied by Dunham-Hanson Co., the block being owned by him. After more than 35 years of business, he retired and has resided for some time in Union Street and Union Place. Several years ago he resided in Webster Avenue, then known as Webster Road, but his house was destroyed by fire and he never rebuilt.

According to the complaint of Anthony Langille, three young Bangor men, William Mishou, William Chaisson and Edward D. Rice, attempted to reproduce some European war scenes at the Orrington fair and made it altogether realistic.

Mr. Langille explained that he went to the fair to give kindly assistance to his friend Miss Emma Sawyer, in dispensing the popular delicacy known as hot dogs from a snow white little tent to the hungry

thongs. All went peacefully and prosperously when there arose an uproar like that which accompanied the charge of the Dublin Fusiliers in the Gallipoli Turks. It was war was war, no mistake, and it was meant for the hot dog tent. The charging regiment, composed of Mishou, Chaisson and Rice, made a complete wreck of the tent, upsetting chafing dishes and bathing the simmering hot dogs in gasoline.

ETNA — The campmeeting is progressing finely. The attendance is unusually large, and the interest is greater than ever. The memorial service in the temple was followed by the interment of ashes of Xilia Barrett at the foot of the flagstaff in Union Square with appropriate ceremonies conducted by Mrs. Vanderbilt, assisted by children dressed in white and bearing flowers. After the service, Vice President Arthur C. Smith announced that the square where the interment was made should hereafter be known as Barrett Square in memory of Harrison D. Barrett.

Mrs. Tillie U. Reynolds of New York is taking the place on the camp program assigned to Mrs. Frances Spaulding who cannot attend on account of her husband's illness.

Mrs. Reynolds is a veteran worker in the Spiritualist ranks, well and favorably known throughout New England and beyond
